# PLANT MANAGER REPORTS

Summer has finally arrived in the Amherstburg area and once again we are experiencing our normal high temperatures and high humidities.

Many of the work areas in our plant historically have been, let us say, not the coolest place in the world to work during the summer months. We are aware of this situation and every effort is being made to improve conditions in the difficult areas.

Our new bottling building will be a decided improvement over our old premises and already many of our people have been moved into these more pleasant surroundings. Before the end of the summer, most of our bottling personnel will have been moved from the old work area to the new building. There are certain other areas in the plant in which improvement can be made and these are being explored and we expect to see some results in the not too distant future. Of course, there will always be some work areas in the plant where it will be impossible to reach the same comfort level as in the Bottling. Dept. These include the stillhouse, the dryhouse, cooker room, etc., but there may be some way in which even these hot, humid areas may be better ventilated and made into a more pleasant work area.

In the Production Dept., Art Peterson and his distillery personnel have been able to maintain their high level of production which was established in April and this must be particularly rewarding to all distillery personnel since they all must feel a sense of accomplishment for a job well done. The Amherstburg Distillery Production now ranks with the rest of our Canadian plants and to each and every

person who contributed to this, may I say congratulations.

The new Ford truck for the Maturing and Blending Dept. has now been delivered and Gord Freeman tells me that the truck is now out to have the body fitted and this unit should be put into use by early July.

In the new Bottling Dept., bottling line number 1 for half-pints has now been operating successfully for two weeks and present indications are that this line will run steady through the balance of 1970. Bottling line number 2 for fifths received its' first tests on Friday, June 12th, and this line too will be fully scheduled as soon as the break-in period has been completed. Following this, we then must move over to the new building, as rapidly as possible, the remaining bottling lines. This movement, of course, is vitally dependent upon the efforts of our bottling maintenance mechanics who are presently being hard pressed to accomplish a difficult work schedule. It has been our desire to do as much of the work using our own people as possible and it looks like we will be able to continue this present arrangement.

At this point in time, the scheduled date for beginning the Christmas wrap operation has been set for the first week in August but this again is dependent upon the relocation of the existing bottling lines into the new building.

On a lighter note, I was happy to receive a phone call this week from Jack Jones who tells me that he is feeling much better and is now able to get around the yard and is somewhat back into his normal routine. Jack tells me that his brother, Harold, who has been off sometime now, is also making rapid

improvement and all of our personnel are pleased to hear that the "Jones' boys" are on the road to recovery.

Jack and Harold Jones will probably notice a big difference in the appearance of the plant yards and grounds when they return to work. Since they have been off, the pavement has all been completed, the entrance to the office and bottling building seeded and planted with shrubs and the flagpole has been relocated from its original site to the new plant entrance. Bob Brinkman tells me that the new Calvert of Canada Limited nameplate has been ordered and will be installed on the new building this month.

Mr. Nickless' responsibilities will include liaison between Marketing and Operations Division, purchasing, material and maintenance standards, packaging and equipment development and other related functions. Mr. Joseph Holly, Gimli Plant Engineer, has been appointed Coordinator of Engineering Services, where he will be responsible for the implementation, coordination and control of all major engineering projects and will provide specific maintenance and engineering services to all sectors of opera-

These changes in organization and responsibilities are effective immediately.

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# SAFETY

As a result of the May 27th Plant Safety. Committee Meeting and discussions conducted with the Department of Labour safety inspectors, the following rules were posted on May 29th and are relisted here as an extra reminder.

WE ARE BOUND BY LAW TO RECOGNIZE AND IMPLEMENT THE FOLLOWING REGULATIONS AND AS OF JUNE 15TH, THE SAFETY EQUIPMENT LISTED BELOW MUST BE WORN BY ALL PERSONNEL IN THE AREAS DESIGNATED.

General Maintenance - All employees to wear safety glasses, safety hats and safety shoes at all times in the Machine Shop and when out on jobs in any department.

<u>Distillery</u> - Hard hats must be worn by all Distillery operators during periods when maintenance or construction work in this department is being carried out.

Maturing - Safety shoes are to be worn by all employees.

Case Bond - All lift truck drivers to wear hard hats. All employees to wear safety shoes.

Bottling Dept. - All dumpers, machine operators and bottling mechanics to wear safety glasses at all times while on duty.

Hard Hats and Non-Prescription safety glasses will be provided free and safety shoes and Prescription safety glasses are obtainable through the 50% agreement in our union contract.

Finally, should any employee find himself in a position where he is unable to comply with these regulations, he should immediately discuss the matter with his department head and some suitable solution will be found.


All players are looking forward to the return match at which Waterloo will be the hosts on Saturday, August 29th.


